The growing food insecurity amongst the tribals of Jammu and Kashmir some recent evidences

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ABSTRACT

Food security has been recognized as a human right. Countries have been entrusted with the task of securing food security. The present study is an attempt to evaluate the status of food security amongst the tribals of Jammu and Kashmir, India. Based on data collected from all 20 districts of J&K, using the Household Food Insecurity Access Scale, the findings of the present analysis validate that the tribals of J&K have moved from being self-sufficient, thus food secure, to increasingly becoming food insecure. The study identifies various important factors, impacting the growing food security of the group under discussion.
